Teacher Instructions

Rationale:

• The purpose of this game is to introduce and reinforce different biome aspects for students. The Big Idea, taken from the grade 4 curriculum is all living things sense and respond to their environment. This game shows how different environmental impacts can affect the health and functioning of different parts of a biome. The game also seeks to help students to understand biomes as large regions with similar environmental features, taken from the content portion of the science curriculum. The game has 3 different versions. Version A has the least amount of cards and an easier to obtain objective, version B incorporates more environmental impacts to biomes, and version C adds in more cards to create a more complex game and harder to achieve main objective.

Logistics:

- 2-4 players
- ages 9+ (tailored to grade 4 BC Curriculum)
- included pieces 116 of cards

Objective:

The goal of the game is to be the first player to lay down 5 matching biome cards to create a
complete and healthy biome. A complete biome set includes the Biome Type, Vegetation,
Temperature, Precipitation, and Wildlife. A biome cannot be considered complete if there are
any damage cards in play on any category cards.

How to play

Refer to student instructions versions A-C

Glossary:

- Biome Type Card This card must be the first card layed down to start building a biome. Without this card a player cannot lay down any category cards.
- Category Cards These cards are the 4 categories (Vegetation, Temperature, Precipitation, and Wildlife) that make up a player's biome. The category cards must match the biome type card that has been laid down.
- Damage Cards (Red) These cards cause an impairment to be placed upon a category card in a player's biome. Place this card directly on top of the category card being damaged. The only way to remove a damage card from a biome is to play a Restore or Ultimate Defense card.
- Restore Cards (Purple) These cards are used to remove a damage card from a player's biome. They can only be played during the card holder's turn. Once the card has been played, this card and the Damage card must go into the discard pile.

- *No Thanks* Cards (Pink) These cards can immediately stop a damage or steal card. They may only be used once, then go into the discard pile.
- Bonus Cards (Orange) These cards can be played on your turn to impair or defend your biome. They may only be played once then go into the discard pile. The OOPS! bonus card must be played immediately once it has been drawn; players cannot use a No Thanks card to veto the OOPS!.
- Played Cards Cards that have been laid down on the table. They may include biome type cards, category cards, damage cards, restore cards, or bonus cards.
- Hand Cards Cards that a player is holding in their hands. These cards are not visible to other players.
- Draw pile Cards that are drawn at the beginning of a player's turn.
- Discard pile Pile where cards are placed after being used, or if a player has too many cards in their hand.
